The competition and organization conform:

- to the Statutes of the FEI, 20th edition, 17 April 1999;
- to the General Regulations, 20th edition that came into operation on 1 January 2000 and revision 2001;
- to the Rules for Jumping Events, 21th edition effective 1st January 2003;
- to the Veterinary Regulations, 9th edition that came into operation on 1 January 2002;
- to the Veterans' Regulations;
- to all corrections and modifications to the aforementioned Rules and Regulations subsequently published by the FEI.
- A process of arbitration is provided within the above mentioned Statutes and the General Regulations of the FEI outlined above. In accordance with this procedure, any appeal against a decision rendered by the FEI or its official representative will be heard before the Sporting Arbitration Tribunal (TAS) in Lausanne, Switzerland.

Veterans European Championships & CSI VETERANS Category B of LA BAULE will be held outdoors.

Dimensions: 160 x 100 meters - grass.

Dimensions: 62 x 60 meters - sand.

130 stables of 9m² and 120 stables of 8m².

1 - COMPETITORS

VETERANS EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Are invited riders from the U.E. Each NF can enter individual riders or a team of 3, 4 or 5 riders with 3 horses maximum per rider. For each NF, only 4 riders maximum with one horse can participate. Horse entered on Veterans European Championships classes can not enter CSI-V-B classes excepted classes N°1 and N°2, on Thursday 13th May 2004. Riders can enter CSI-V-B classes with their second or third horse.

CSI-V-B

45 years and over for women and 49 years and over for men

- 35 French riders (+/-) authorized by the Direction Technique Nationale of the FFE
 - 50 Foreign Riders (+/-) selected by their National Federations at the invitation of the FFE and the Organizing Committee. The CSI VETERANS will be run at two different levels:

- Small tour (1m10)

- Large tour (1m20)

Riders can compete in one or the other

HORSES: a horse (of six-year-old and older) maximum per rider

GROOM: 1 groom per competitor

2 - ALLOWANCES OFFERED (Art. 182 - 183)

a) French and foreign competitors

The Organizing Committee will negotiate a price for rooms in Lo Baule's four-star hotel and will communicate a possible list of lodgings to all the riders. The Organizing Committee will give you the evening party time table at your arrival
 Every afternoon - catering at the ground.

A grooming service will be available to riders who make their reservations four weeks prior to the start of the competition at a cost of Euros 11.00 per hour.

b) Groom

- Free breakfast served at the stables;
- Shower and washrooms close to the boxes.

c) Horse

The definitively listed horses will be lodged free of charge in boxes furnished exclusively with wood shavings starting from midday on Wednesday, 12 May until midday on Monday, 17 May.

It is possible for stables to be furnished with wood shavings at a supplementary cost of Euros 12 (including tax) per bale and hay at a rate of Euros 5 (including taxes) per small bale.

If competitors arrive ahead of the competition, horses can be lodged in other boxes at a cost of Euros 37 (including tax) per horse, per day.

At the time of the veterinary visit enclosure within the International stables is obligatory.

d) Arrival

The day and time of arrival for riders and horses, as well as the means of transportation used, must be notified to the Organizer in order to ensure their welcome at the competition venue.

e) Advertising on competitors and the horses (Art. 186)

Competitors are authorized to carry the logo of their personal sponsor on their saddle cloth in accordance with Art. 186. Riders who will not follow the rule will not be allowed to enter the competition ground.

2 - ENTRY FEES

Entry fees per horse clear following the veterinary inspection: Euros 300. These fees include the box furnished with wood shavings, and CHF12.50 per horse contribution to the M.C.P. of the F.E.I.

For foreign riders payment can be made at the competitors' office at the declaration time for participants on Wednesday, 12 May before 6:30 p.m.

Following the registration of definitive entries no substitution of French or foreign competitors' horses will be allowed without the express permission of the Fédération Française d'Equitation/DIN or of the Organizing Committee - at least two days before the start of the competition (Art. 121 & 3rd paragraph).

VII - CUSTOMS FORMALITIES

- 1 - All horses traveling from a non-EU country entering French territory must be in possession of a temporary IMPORTATION permit issued by UNIC (104, rue Récamier - 75002 PARIS Tel. +33 (0)1 45 08 88 60 / Fax +33 (0)1 45 08 88 09)
- 2 - All foreign competitors taking part in the Veterans European Championships & CSI VETERANS Category B event, in order to cross the border, must be in possession of a certificate issued by the Organizing Committee with a description of each horse.
- 3 - On entering the French territory, horses will be covered by a temporary admission permit. A deposit exemption will be endorsed on presentation of this permit and of the required temporary import documents.

2 - VETERINARY MATTERS (A)

ACCORDING TO VETERINARY REGULATIONS 9th edition, 1st January 2002 and JUMPING RULES 2nd edition, 1st January 2003.

TESTING, VETERINARY INSPECTIONS and PASSPORT CONTROL:

Will be performed in accordance with Veterinary Regulations, Art. 1011 and the Rules for Jumping Events - Appendix VII and the Special Regulations for veteran riders.

The veterinary inspection will take place at the stables on Wednesday 12 May at 6:00 p.m..

Other inspection on Thursday 13 May 2004 at 10:00 a.m. at same place.

"General Regulations", 10th Edition, revised 2001, will apply.

Art. 109.1

Every horse entered for any competition at CSIs or CSI* in a foreign country, and all horses entered for other CSIs*, CSIOs, Championships, Regionals and Olympic Games, whether at Home or in foreign countries, must have an official valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 109.2

Horses taking part in CSIs and CSI* in their own country are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned in paragraph 1. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable by diagram. Unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin of horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, Vet. Reg. Appendix VI (except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an F.E.I. passport, or a National Passport approved by the F.E.I. has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given no less than 21 days and no more than 92 days apart.

In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding 12 months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must have been given within the preceding 7 days, including the day of the competition or of entry into the competition stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer's instructions, which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling. In many cases booster injections are recommended by the manufacturers and by National Veterinary authorities/Regulatory Authorities at intervals more frequent than 12 months.

SAMPLING FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES

(Vet. Reg. Chap. V & VI and Annex III)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCI***/****, CSIs (Category A), CIOS, World Cup Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CI sampling is recommended in CI****/****, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Art. VR 1000017.4).

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME

(Groups I and II only)

The Organizing Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP Programme.

According to the medication control program (MCP) in force in Groups I and II, all samples taken according to Art. 1017.1 of the Veterinary Regulations have been analyzed by the Laboratoire de la Fédération Nationale des Courses Françaises.

4 - HEALTH CONDITIONS FOR HORSES IMPORTATION

IX - MISCELLANEOUS

1 - OBJECTIONS / CLAIMS

To be valid, any objection/claim shall be filed in writing and include a deposit equivalent to CHF 50.

2 - PRIZES / CLASSIFICATION (Art. 128 - 129)

Mounted attendance at prize giving, at the end of each class, will be obligatory for the eight top placed riders in each class (or the basis of one prize for each three participating competitors - Art. 129.3).

2 - REGULATION OF PRIZES AND INDEMNITIES (Art. 126)

Prizes will not be monetary, but in the form of gifts.

4 - DOCTOR / VETERINARIAN / FARRIER

All medical, veterinary as well as farriery care will be the responsibility of the owners, riders or other interested parties.

The Organizing Committee will not contribute towards their payments.

5 - INSURANCE

'Every rider or horse owner is solely responsible for third party risks for himself, his employees, his assistants, as well as third party risk for his own horse. It is therefore strongly recommended that every rider or owner contact a 'Civil Responsibility' insurer to arrange sufficient cover for competitions whether they are abroad or in his own country, and to rigorously maintain such policies.'

6 - COMPETITION ORGANIZER (Art. 115)

In the event of unforeseen circumstances, the Organizing Committee, with the approval of the Chef d'Equipe and the Ground Jury, reserve the right to modify the Programme in any way in order to resolve the situation and may, in certain circumstances, have the right to cancel or postpone classes. Such modifications must be communicated to all the competitors and officials as quickly as possible, and not later than the General Secretariat by the foreign judge.

7 - AUTHORIZED ENTRY INTO THE EVENT STABLE AREA

In order to be allowed necessary access to the FEI stable area, the names of owners (maximum of two per horse) - must be declared at the same time as the definitive entry of their horse. It is essential that riders and their grooms indicate their full names and role to the Jumping Secretariat before 5 May 2004.

9 - SPECIAL RULES FOR VETERANS RIDERS - 5th edition 1995 - Show Jumping

Art. 5000

The goal of this regulation is to fix conditions for competitions and events for VETERAN riders around the world taking into account specific problems that are exclusively applied.

Specific regulations extracted from the FEI regulations for show jumping apply:

Art. 5001

Definition of a VETERAN rider.

The following can compete as VETERAN riders:

- women who pass their 45th birthday in that year,
- and men who pass their 49th birthday in that year.

Riders must not have competed in senior show jumping competitions, as well as CSI 2* to 5* or even at a higher level in the same year, and classes with an opening round above 130 cm.

Each rider must be in possession of a valid license from his/her National Federation.

By entering VETERAN riders into an International competition, the National Federations are certifying that these competitors fulfill the required conditions.

International Competitions :

The following competitions can be organized for VETERAN riders: CSI Cat A and B and CSIO

Obstacles and courses :

Courses for VETERAN riders comprise 8 to 12 obstacles.

Overs with have a width in proportion to their height, of 1m20 to 1m30.

NORMAL STABLE SECURITY/STABLE SURVEILLANCE FOR INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

ENFORCEMENT DIRECTIVES OF RV ART. 1005 3.B

1 - ACCESS TO THE ENCLOSED STABLE AREA

The stables must be completely enclosed by a barrier placed within an appropriate restrictive perimeter (stable area) which will serve both as a deterrent to the admission of unauthorized personnel and to the exit of horses. The structure must be sufficiently large to allow the evacuation of horses from the stable area in case of an emergency, but it will remain within the confines of the perimeter.

Whenever possible the stable area must include only stables. The farries, caravans, etc., must not have access to this zone unless they are serving specifically as lodgings for horses or grooms.

Access to stables will be limited to those persons indicated in Art. 1005 2.5.2 of the RV. It is essential that the official responsible for authorizing access must be a trustworthy person of seniority from within the Organizing Committee.

2 - ENTRY CONTROL

A control system must operate at all entrance gates in order to allow, by a reliable and efficient method, identification of all those who enter and leave the stables at any time. Additional vigilance must be applied when identifying persons and reasons for entering the stables during the nighttime hours.

3 - SURVEILLANCE OF THE STABLE AREA

At least one stable steward directly responsible to the Chief Steward, must be present or readily available in the vicinity of the stable area 24 hours a day during the entire competition. He may be helped by assistants if necessary. The steward or his assistants must regularly patrol the whole stable area, without a pre-determined pattern in order to discourage any unlawful practices or abuse toward the horses. The steward responsible for stable surveillance must immediately be informed of any infraction which must, in turn, be reported to the Chief Steward.

The duty of the steward is to safeguard the welfare of the horses and to prevent any form of unlawful practices.

4 - GROOMS

It is appreciated that grooms may wish to remain with their horses during the night. Only grooms duly registered with the Organizing Committee have the authority to do so. The person in charge must ensure that these grooms, or any other authorized persons with access to their horses, are familiar with security and the rigorous surveillance procedures operating throughout the competition.

5 - MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT THE COMPETITION AREA

Movement of horses between the stables, practice ring, rest areas and main competition arena must be strictly controlled. An example of the optimum layout for the infrastructures of Show Jumping and dressage is attached. It is appreciated that flexibility will be required depending on the requirements of other disciplines.

6 - SURVEILLANCE OF THE PRACTICE RING

The Chief Steward must ensure that all the practice rings are adequately monitored during official opening times. He must also ensure that all practice rings are practice areas is adequately stewarded at all times when they are officially open. He must also ensure that random surveillance of practice rings is carried out when they are officially closed.

7 - REST AREA

For all outdoor competitions, a grazing area must be provided and be subject to visual surveillance. If this area is available, it must be used exclusively for grazing horses or walking them in hand.

The Foreign Judge/TD of competitions must especially monitor the application of prescribed directives, but in the most reasonable manner possible for each discipline. He must be aware of any shortcomings and, if necessary, changing the category of a competition could be considered.

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WELFARE OF THE HORSE

CODE of CONDUCT

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in International equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

1 - At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.

2 - Horses and competitors must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.

3 - Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition area, ground surface, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.

4 - Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.

5 - The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.
